Just take them to church


I promise their laughter, those loud words, those tiny feet stomps aren't distracting or disruptive.

Rich Reflections

I'm listening to the book "Surrender" by the lead singer of the band U2, Bono (Paul David Hewson). Who is also a humanitarian, activist, philanthropist and Christian. It's compelling these musicians wrestle; living with fame, fortune & faith.

I'm going to share an extended excerpt of one of the most moving chapters. One that has been both inspiring my faith as well as challenging it.

Chap. 37 - "Love is bigger than anything in its way"

"Why am I always talking about the scriptures? Because they sustained me in the most difficult years, and they remain a plum line to gauge how crooked the wall of my ego has become. I return to a spiritual master like the Apostle Paul way back in the 1st century of the modern era. I go to someone who overcame himself.

"How does someone who first shows up as a monumental, pain in the butt, fundamentalist become someone who can write the greatest ode to love in 2000 years? Somewhere on his spiritual path, he discovers love is bigger than anything in its way.

"So no matter what I say, what I believe, and what I do, I'm bankrupt without love. Love never gives up. Love cares more for others than for self. Love doesn't want what it doesn't have. Love doesn't strut. Doesn't have a swelled head. Doesn't force itself on others. It isn't always "me first". Doesn't fly off the handle, doesn't keep score of the sins of others, doesn't revel when others grovel, takes pleasure in the flowering of truth. Puts up with anything. Trusts God always, always looks for the best, never looks back, but keeps going to the end." — 1 Corinthians 13; The Message

"This is out of a man who faced jail and death for his beliefs and learned that love is not sentimental, but tough. That it's about speaking hard truths to power or hard truths to yourself. The man who first appeared a contemptible human being is now transformed into a teacher. It's while incarcerated for his beliefs that he writes some of literature's greatest explorations of love.

"This is a spiritual maturity that feels so far out of reach for me. What the human spirit longs for, may not be corralled by any sect or denomination, contained by a building. It's more likely a daily discipline. Daily surrender and rebirth. "It's more likely that church is not a place but a practice, that the practice becomes the place. There is no promised land only the promised journey, the pilgrimage. We search through the noise for God. We learn to ask better questions of ourselves and each other. I search my life for clues that betray the location of the God's Presence. For starters, we look to who is standing beside us or down the road. The ones whose roof we share or the ones around the corner who have no roof. Mystics tell us God is present in the present. What Doctor King described as 'the fierce urgency of now.'

"God is present in the love between us, in the crowd, in a marriage, in the way we meet the world. God is present in love, expressed as action. Whatever the differences of the great faith traditions, they find common ground in one place, among the poor and vulnerable is where the Signal is the strongest.

"So where is God? Well, I hope God is with those of us who live such comfortable lives. I know God is with the poorest and most vulnerable. In the slums and cardboard boxes where the poor have to play house. In the doorways as we step over the divine on our way to work. God is in the cries, heard under the rubble of war, in the bare hands digging for air. God is with the refugee, I hear His only Son was one. God is with the poor and the vulnerable. And God is with us if we are with them."

Having read that, my mind turns to Jesus and his words to us, "Whoever wants to be my disciple must take up their cross. For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it. What good is it to gain the whole world, yet forfeit your soul?"

I'm curious how we can wrestle and grow spiritually if quit focusing on ourselves, and look around us to see who God calls us to love? To open and involve ourselves in "the fierce urgency of now."

Jeremiah 29 Project... What is that!?

Osakis Lutheran is part of the Jeremiah 29 Project. It connects congregations with their communities in ways to promote community and congregational sustainability. Leaders participate with other leaders from across our NW Minn Synod, each engaged in their own community projects. We're part of the first 10 congregations to do this.

When we think about Jeremiah 29, we often think about Jeremiah 29:11 *"For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm; to give you a future and a hope."* These words were for a community captured and taken from their birthplace. People were anxious to get back to their homeland.

Jeremiah was speaking the truth they needed to hear; they would have to say until generations had passed, and the people had changed their ways. Yet, Jeremiah's message was not despair, but one of hope. Not just hope for the future, but hope for right now.

In a less familiar verse, Jeremiah writes, "Seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray. For in its welfare you will find your welfare." Invest in where you are now. Have children. Plant crops. Build a home. Jeremiah says, "pray for their land." This is a radical message, because who would want to pray for their captors? This is a way of saying, "Love your enemies."

Jeremiah reminds us that church is not private, it is not apart from the world, but in the world. We are called to journey from the center of power to the fringes of society to experience God in new ways. Where you support community vitality, you create space for congregational vitality.
