Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

As Christians who follow Jesus, the one we in the Bible and not on TV, we have a unique view of citizenship. Jesus didn't favor one human government or another.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

As Christians who follow Jesus, the one we in the Bible and not on TV, we have a unique view of citizenship. Jesus didn't favor one human government or another.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Rich Reflections

As Christians who follow Jesus, the one we in the Bible and not on TV, we have a unique view of citizenship. Jesus didn't favor one human government or another.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. "God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.

Rich Reflections

As Christians who follow Jesus, the one we in the Bible and not on TV, we have a unique view of citizenship. Jesus didn't favor one human government or another.

Jesus' primary concern was with "the lost, the last, and the least"—the outcast, the downtrodden, and the oppressed. He crossed many boundaries that had served to make some people insiders ("acceptable") and some outsiders ("unacceptable").

Jesus broke dividing walls to care for:

Samaritan woman, was conisdered immoral man born blind, "a sinner" Canaanite woman, a gentile/sinner Lepers who were unclean touched the dead (to raise them) "worked" on Sabbath to heal & feed woman with 12 yr. hemorrhage pagan man with demons son of Roman soldier (the enemy) children—welcomed & blessed

Jesus shows us that in the Kingdom of God there are no dividing lines between "us and them." And that list is only a partial one.

Paul, who had a privileged, insider life, followed Jesus calling and lead to live his life in a way that went against the grain, and crossed traditional boundaries. He wrote much of what's in the New Testament—it started as letters to believers.

Philippians 3

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh *[human rules]*, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. *[technically he was a Roman citizen]*

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. 8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, *[lit. "dung"]* in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him,

...18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; ...their minds are set on earthly things. 20 But our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

"God has to do with every creature, and every creature has to do with God, whether they recognize it or not. God's work in the world must be viewed in and through a universal frame of reference." (Dr. Terry Fretheim, Professor Emeritus of Old Testament, Luther Seminary.)

As noted in the quote above, and illustrated in the life of Jesus, God is interested in and cares about everyone. Yes, everyone! So as followers of Jesus it is our calling as citizens of heaven—by our baptism—to care for every person.
